TRUSTEES' REPORT YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

The Trustees present their report and financial statements for the period 1 April 2013 to 31 March 2014.

The Company is a charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies both with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) as issued by the Charity Commissioners of England and Wales.

The Charity Commission for Northern Ireland will soon commence registration of Northern Ireland Charities. Until registration begins, the Commission deems charities to be organisations which have registered with Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) for charitable tax purposes. The NIABT has been registered with Her HMRC for charitable tax purposes since 2002 and will be registered by the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland in due course.

Legal status

The Northern Ireland Assembly and Business Trust is a company limited by guarantee registered in Northern Ireland, registration number NI 43484, which was incorporated under the Companies (Northern Ireland) Order 1986 on the 19 June 2002. The Company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The guarantors are the members and those past members ceasing to be members in the previous year. The liability of each guarantor is limited to £1.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the Trust is to advance and encourage business understanding of the Assembly and Assembly Members' understanding of business.

Background

The establishment, in 2002, of the Northern Ireland Assembly and Business Trust (NIABT), offered parliamentarians and the business sector in Northern Ireland an alternative educational and information discussion forum around which each group could develop a greater understanding of respective needs. As an independent, neutral and self-financing educational charity, NIABT organises programmes for Assembly Members and Business representatives involving briefings, seminars, visits and fellowship placements.

Programmes must be non-partisan, non-lobbying, mutually educational and informative. NIABT is modelled on similar schemes, for example Westminster's Industry & Parliament Trust (IPT).

The NIABT works to forge links with, and promote the exchange of knowledge and information between local businesses and parliamentarians in Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, Westminster and the European Parliament.

Open to businesses from all sectors and of all sizes, the NIABT organises activities including briefings, educational visits, fellowships and seminars.

The NIABT is a registered charity and is subject to its Articles of Association, which sets out the various rules and regulations by which the NIABT manages its internal affairs. This document also contains the aims and objectives of the NIABT.

A Memorandum of Understanding with the Assembly Commission states the relationship between the NIABT and the Northern Ireland Assembly, particularly in relation to resources.

The Assembly is responsible for the costs attributed to MLAs on NIABT business and as such, the NIABT is subject to internal audit scrutiny.

The Northern Ireland Assembly's contribution and expenditure related to NIABT activities is audited by the Northern Ireland Assembly Audit Office.

The vast majority of NIABT expenditure and financial transactions relate to the NIABT bank account which is wholly funded by the business membership. Therefore, this account is subject to external auditing, which is carried out by RSM McClure Watters.

NIABT's mission statement:

"To advance and encourage business understanding of the Assembly and Assembly Members' understanding of business."

Activities are twofold:

- Providing Assembly Members with a better insight into how the local business sector operates thereby facilitating them in making more informed judgements on policy and legislation relating to the local economy, and;
- Improving the business community's understanding of how the Assembly and devolution works and how
 policy and legislation is initiated and developed.

The Board is also entitled to co-opt a Vice-Chairperson to the Board if required. The Vice-Chairperson shall not be an elected representative. Dr Joanne Stuart OBE is the Vice-Chairperson of the Trust.

- Strengthening the understanding of the Trust

The expected outcomes were identified as:

- Better policy making.
- More / better informed legislation.
- Realistic understanding by the business sector of what is achievable.
- More focused and targeted influence.

Objectives 2014- 2015

- To develop a comprehensive programme of events and resources to support the aims of the Trust 1.
- To grow business membership, with a focus on ensuring diversity within the Trust 2.
- To increase the contribution from a diverse range of MLAs 3.
- To promote and market the work of the Trust to the Northern Ireland business community and within 4. the NI Assembly

Programmes

Since restoration in 2007, the Northern Ireland Assembly and Business Trust (NIABT) has been working to develop its programmes to meet the needs of its membership.

The programme of events offered from April 2013 to March 2014 included an enhanced NIABT European Education Programme which included extensive contact with NI MEPs and lobbying organisations positioned in Brussels. It also saw the continuation of a Westminster Educational Programme, which encompassed engagements in both the House of Commons and the House of Lords. During this Programme, the NIABT delegation received presentations from a number of MPs

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and lobbying bodies. An educational visit to the Houses of the Oireachtas was also conducted during the time of this report.

The Trust also arranged a series of briefings throughout the year with briefings becoming a regular monthly feature of the NIABT calendar. These were delivered both by prominent members of the local business community, MLAs and Ministers. The fellowship programmes continued throughout the year.

The NIABT President also continued to host the annual President's Dinner, to which he invited Daniel Calleja Crespo, Director-General of the Enterprise and Industry Directorate-General to attend as guest speaker.

A number of education visits to local businesses also took place during the year. These visits allow local businesses to highlight areas of interest within their sector and give a practical perspective of individual initiatives and practices.

Events Held:

April 2013:

- Michelle Mcliveen MLA, Chairperson of the Culture, Arts & Leisure Committee provided an overview
 of the role of the Committee and report on the findings of a recent Committee Inquiry into Maximising
 the Potential of the Creative Industries. Stephen McGowan from the Department of Culture, Arts and
 Leisure (DCAL) then provided a briefing on the creative industries, delivering a first-hand view of the
 positive impact the creative industries are having on Northern Ireland.
- Brenda Hale MLA visited Cullen Demolition through the fellowship scheme. This visit allowed Brenda
 the opportunity to find out more about a local business in her constituency.
- Members of the Northern Ireland Assembly and Business Trust visited Norbrook Laboratories Ltd.
 Organised as part of the NIABT Education Programme, this event provided both MLAs and business
 members with an opportunity to learn more about the entrepreneurial vision of this local global
 company.

May 2013:

- Members of the Northern Ireland Assembly and Business Trust visited Moy Park. Organised as part
 of the NIABT Education Programme, this event provided both MLAs and business members with an
 opportunity to learn more about the export vision and success story of this local company.
- Phil Flaxton, Chief Executive of Skill Exchange UK delivered a briefing, outlining plans to create additional local Skill Exchange Hubs in Northern Ireland.
- Following the formalities of the Annual General Meeting, the event continued with Daithi McKay MLA, Dr Esmond Birnie, PricewaterhouseCoopers and Roger Pollen, Federation of Small Businesses participating in a panel debate themed on the issue of corporation tax.

June 2013:

 Chris Lyttle MLA visited Centre for Competiveness through the fellowship scheme. This visit allowed Chris the opportunity to find out more about local business challenges in his constituency.

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The Houses of the Oireachtas Educational Programme provided attendees with a unique opportunity
to gain an insight into the role of the Houses of the Oireachtas through a series of presentations and
engagement with local TDs, lobby groups and representatives of cross border agencies.

July 2013:

 Phil Flanagan MLA participated in two separate fellowship visits within his constituency. He visited both BT in Enniskillen and P Clarke's Quarries in Lisnaskea to find out more about local business challenges.

September 2013:

 Minister for Finance and Personnel, Simon Hamilton MLA, presented an overview on the economic challenges and opportunities businesses will face in 2013/ 2014.

October 2013:

- The Westminster Education Programme provided an NIABT delegation with an introduction on how
 central government works and how legislation shaped there affects businesses in Northern Ireland.
- William McCulla, Invest NI Director of Corporate Finance was joined by Martin Symington of Pure Roast Coffee to deliver a briefing on Access to Finance for local business from both a theoretical and practical perspective.

November 2013:

- An NIABT delegation visited Brussels to participate in the European Educational Programme. During
 the trip, the delegation met with a number of key policy makers from Brussels, the NI MEPs and
 representatives from the Northern Ireland Executive Office.
- The Committee for Employment and Learning Chair, Robin Swann MLA delivered a briefing on the Committee Inquiry into Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) in Northern Ireland. The purpose of the Inquiry was to identify areas where the CEIAG strategy for Northern Ireland is failing to meet the needs of target groups including school age pupils, young people and the unemployed.

December 2013:

- The NIABT Christmas reception gave an opportunity to Ivan Lewis MP, Shadow Secretary of State for Northern Ireland to address the NIABT. Mr Lewis focused on the economic outlook in Northern Ireland in general and also highlighted the Small Business Saturday initiative.
- Members of the NIABT accompanied Members of the Assembly's Enterprise, Trade and Investment Committee to visit SolarPrint, an SME from Dublin, which has successfully drawn down funding from Framework Programme 7 (FP7) The purpose of the visit was to provide members with a practical demonstration of how SMEs should be positioned in order to maximise opportunities provided through EU funding.

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January 2014:

- Phil Flanagan MLA participated in a fellowship visit with NIIRTA to see at first hand the challenges faced by independent retailers.
- Paul McAlister from Paul McAlister Architects hosted an NIABT delegation and Members of the Environment Committee to demonstrate how the passive house concept works and its many benefits. The presentation was followed by a tour of the dwelling in North Down.

February 2014:

- Phil Flanagan MLA participated in a fellowship visit with Manufacturing NI to see at first hand the challenges faced in the manufacturing sector.
- The Environment Minister Mark Durkan MLA, presented an overview of planning policies for 2014.
- Daniel Calleja Crespo Director-General of the Enterprise and Industry Directorate-General in the European Commission was the guest speaker at the annual President's Dinner.

March 2014:

- Judith Cochrane MLA participated in a fellowship visit with the George Best City Airport to see at first hand the challenges faced with this local airport and also to see the airport's plans for the future.
- Aidan Gough, Director of Strategy & Policy at InterTradeIreland, presented an overview of InterTradeIreland's work and commented on latest economic trends.
- Robin Swann MLA took part in a fellowship visit with Wrightbus in Ballymena to see first hand the
 exciting plans this local company has for the future.
- A networking event was held for the Young Directors Forum, Institute of Directors. Numerous MLAs
 attended the event and had a chance to engage with the audience through a series of round table
 discussions.

Achievements and Performance

The NIABT set a number of objectives for the year. What follows is a summary of performance against key objectives.

NIABT Objectives 2012-2014

Objective 1 – To develop a comprehensive programme of events and resources to support the aims of the Trust

Met

1. A target of running at least one monthly event during each session was met. These events included seminars, visits and fellowships. This target was maintained and exceeded throughout the year.

- Three Inter-Parliamentary Educational Programmes (IPEPs) were delivered during the year. The IPEPs held were the Houses of the Oireachtas Educational Programme, Westminster Educational Programme and European Educational Programme in Brussels.
- 3. Bi-monthly Board of Trustee meetings held and programmes discussed. Five meetings were held throughout the year.
- 4. A target of arranging four fellowships in the year was exceeded. Ten fellowships were carried out during the year.

Objective 2 - To grow business membership, with a focus on ensuring diversity within the Trust

Met

1. Business membership grew from 160 to 170 companies during the year with 17 of the 18 constituencies represented. A large spread of business sectors are now represented within the business membership.

Not Met

2. The Board decided that it was not worthwhile to hold regional events so this initiative has not been progressed.

Objective 3 - To increase the contribution from a diverse range of MLAs

Met

- An increasing number of MLAs attended events throughout the year. 152 MLAs have been in attendance throughout the years' events. This is a dramatic increase of 40% in comparison to a figure of 108 in 2012/2013.
- Secretariat staff continue to liaise with Party Support staff and with MLAs directly in relation to marketing events. Secretariat staff also liaise closely with relevant Committee staff in relation to the marketing of relevant events, to help ensure that MLAs are fully aware of all relevant NIABT events.
- 3. A number of Ministers have been directly involved with the Trust this year, including the Minister for Finance and Personnel who delivered a briefing on the economy and the Minister for the Environment who also deliver a planning policy briefing. The Minister for Regional Development attended the annual Presidents Dinner.

Not Met

 The Board decided that it was not worthwhile to hold regional events so this initiative has not been progressed.

Objective 4 – To promote and market the work of the Trust to the Northern Ireland business community and within the NI Assembly.

- 1. The website, www.niabt.org, contains information pertaining to the NIABT and includes details of events, past and present and is updated in a regular timely manner.
- 2. An electronic newsletter has been developed and has now replaced the paper copy newsletter which had previously been used. The e-newsletter has been issued biannually.
- 3. New membership flyers have been produced and used predominantly in communications with prospective new business members.
- 4. In an attempt to trim costs, e-invites have been used for events where possible. These have been created by NIABT secretariat staff.
- 5. NIABT secretariat staff have attended four external events with strategic external partners, to further market the work of and to promote the NIABT.
- 6. The NIABT Tweets regularly and has a following of over 1200.

Financial Review

The Trust receives monthly bank statements which are monitored against financial spreadsheets held within the NIABT Administration Team

The Trust closed on 31 March 2014 with a balance of £41,019. This included contributions of £40,767 from business membership.

£53,527 was spent on NIABT activities throughout the year.

The carried forward balance of £41,019 will be used to continue supporting the work of the NIABT, e.g. in developing programmes and events to further meet the objectives of the NIABT.

NIABT Growth

Since the restoration of the NIABT from warm storage in 2007 following a period of suspension of the Northern Ireland Assembly there have been periods of both steady and rapid growth. The membership has now risen from 160 members to 170 members over the past 12 months. Membership has risen from 21 members in 2007 to 170 members in March 2014.

Events will become more MLA and Committee led as the NIABT plans to focus more on the work of relevant Committees where appropriate. This will enable the business community to find out more about the internal workings of the Northern Ireland Assembly.
